



A PRO SE GUIDE TO FILING A NOTICE OF APPEAL AFTER IMMIGRATION CASE DISMISSAL

Do you want to file an appeal after your immigration case was dismissed even though you objected to dismissal? If so, you need to file a Notice of Appeal with the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) to start your appeal process. This guide walks you through the steps to file a Notice of Appeal.

This guide is not a substitute for independent legal advice supplied by a lawyer familiar with your case.

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1. Who is this guide for?

Starting in May 2025, attorneys for the U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) have been asking immigration judges to dismiss people's **“removal proceedings”** in immigration court. **“Removal proceedings”** are hearings held in front of an immigration judge to decide whether the person will be deported.

When the immigration judge dismisses the removal proceedings, ICE agents then arrest the person, often in the hallway as soon as they leave the immigration court. ICE is doing this to put people in expedited removal,¹ which allows ICE to deport a person without seeing an immigration judge, except in certain circumstances.²

This guide is for **“pro se”** people whose removal proceedings in immigration court were dismissed and they want to **“appeal”** the judge's decision. **“Pro se”** is a legal term that means people who are representing themselves without a lawyer. An **“appeal”** is when you ask a higher court to look at your case again because you think the lower court made a mistake.

If you want to appeal the immigration court's decision, you must start the process by filing a **Notice of Appeal** with the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA).

² People who express a fear of returning to their country of origin should be given a Credible Fear Interview (CFI) with someone from the Asylum Office within USCIS. If they are denied, they can have that determination reviewed by an immigration judge. If their CFI is granted, they will be allowed to go back to the immigration judge to apply for fear-based relief.

2. How do I appeal the dismissal of my immigration case?

To start the appeal process, you need to prepare a **Notice of Appeal**. You must include:

1. Notice of Appeal Form (Form EOIR-26)
 - This is the form you have to submit to appeal the immigration court's decision to dismiss the case. The checklist below walks you through each question on the form.

2. Payment of \$1,010.00 or a Fee Waiver Form (Form EOIR-26A)
 - There is a \$1,010.00 filing fee⁴ for the Notice of Appeal. If you cannot afford to pay the filing fee, you must provide information about your finances in the Form EOIR-26A in order to request a fee waiver. If you do not include payment or a fee waiver form, your appeal will be rejected.

These documents must be **received** by the Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA) **within 30 calendar days** of the date of your hearing when the immigration judge made their decision to dismiss your case. A calendar day includes each day on the calendar, including weekends and holidays.

Remember: You must ensure that the BIA **RECEIVES** your Notice of Appeal paperwork within 30 days. Make sure you mail it with enough time in advance to make sure the BIA receives it by the deadline. If the BIA receives your Notice of Appeal after the deadline, it will not consider your appeal and the immigration judge's decision will become final.

⁴ On July 4, 2025, President Trump signed a new law that increases some immigration-related fees. On July 17, 2025, the government confirmed that the new fee for appeals to the BIA is \$1,010.

3. Where do I submit my notice of appeal?

You need to mail a copy of the documents listed above to both the **Board of Immigration Appeals (BIA)** and the **government attorney**.

You should also provide a copy of the notice of appeal to your deportation officer.

What is the address for the government attorney?

The office of the government attorney is known as the “Office of the Principal Legal Advisor” (OPLA) or “Office of Chief Counsel” (OCC). There are OPLA/OCC offices all over the country – just like immigration courts. It is important to send your documents to the correct location.

You need to mail your appeal to the OPLA/OCC office that handled the case at the immigration court.

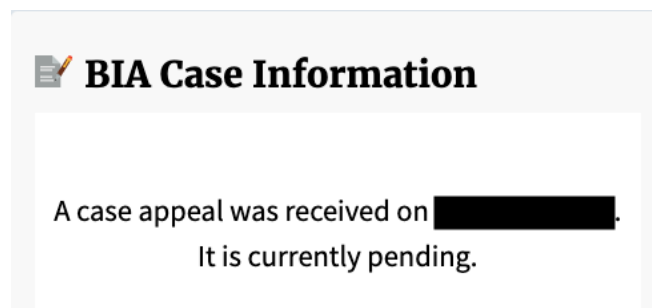
At the end of this guide, we have attached a list of the addresses of each immigration court and the government attorney office that handles cases at each court. Sometimes those addresses can change, so, if possible, we recommend also visiting <https://www.ice.gov/contact/field-offices?office=12> for a list of OPLA/OCC locations in each state to confirm that the address is up to date.

You do **not** need to mail the Notice of Appeal to the immigration court. The reason why is that the immigration court no longer has authority over your case.

4. What happens next?

After you submit your Notice of Appeal, the BIA will send you a filing receipt that will say that they have received your appeal. If you haven't received this filing receipt within two weeks of your Notice of Appeal being delivered, you can check the status of your case by:

- Visiting <https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/>. Enter your A number, which begins with the letter A and is followed by an 8- or 9-digit number. Once you enter your A number, look under "BIA Case Information." It will look like this:



- Or, calling 1-800-898-7180 and checking the status with your A number by following the prompts.

Remember: Filing a Notice of Appeal starts the appeals process. After receiving your Notice of Appeal, the BIA will send you a package in the mail that contains a copy of the transcript of your immigration court hearing, the decision of the immigration judge, and a schedule for when your written brief to the BIA is due. Your brief will include your legal argument about why the immigration judge was wrong to dismiss your case. While you are waiting for this package, try to find legal counsel to write your brief and represent you on your appeal.

If you are detained, tell your ICE deportation officer that you have appealed the immigration judge's decision and give them a copy of your Notice of Appeal.

The government cannot deport you or put you in expedited removal while your appeal is pending before the BIA. If the government attempts to schedule you for a Credible Fear Interview while your appeal is pending with the BIA, you should inform your ICE deportation officer that they must wait for the BIA to issue a decision on your appeal before they can schedule the fear interview. The reason for this is that it is not legally possible for someone to have an appeal pending with the BIA and be in an expedited removal process at the same time.

5. Checklist for Notice of Appeal

Below are template documents that you will need to prepare a Notice of Appeal. You can complete it on your computer or print it out (single-sided) and write legibly in blue or black ink. You must complete this in English.

Follow these instructions to make sure you are completing it correctly:

☐ Complete Form EOIR-26: “Notice of Appeal from a Decision of an Immigration Judge” (template provided below)

1. List Name(s) and “A” Number(s) of all Respondent(s)/Applicant(s):

- Enter your full name and A-number.
- Enter the full names and A-numbers of any family members whose cases were also dismissed along with yours in the same decision by the immigration judge.

2. I am the Respondent/Applicant — DHS-ICE (*Mark only one box.*)

- You must select the box next to Respondent/Applicant. This box is already checked for you in the template below.

3. I am DETAINED — NOT DETAINED (*Mark only one box.*)

- Select “Detained.” This box is already checked for you in the template below.

4. My last hearing was at _____ (*Location, City, State*)

- Enter the location of the immigration court where your case was dismissed. At the end of this guide, you will find a list of the location of immigration courts.

5. What decision are you appealing?

- You must select the first box: “I am filing an appeal from the Immigration Judge’s decision in *merits* proceedings (example: removal, deportation, exclusion, asylum, etc.) dated _____.” This box is already checked for you in the template below.
- Enter the date that the immigration judge made the decision to dismiss your case.
- If you have a copy of the immigration judge’s decision, attach it.

6. State in detail the reason(s) for this appeal.

- Write a short paragraph about why you want to appeal. You can also attach a separate piece of paper with the reasons why the immigration court was wrong to dismiss your case. **We have included some sample reasons for appealing below.**
- At the end, write: “Respondent reserves the right to raise additional arguments upon receipt of the record of proceedings and/or obtaining legal counsel.”
- Here are some suggestions that you can include for different situations. You can list one or more of these options:

If ICE filed a motion to dismiss in order to put you in expedited removal:

“The Immigration Judge committed legal and factual errors by granting ICE’s motion to dismiss in order to place Respondent into expedited removal. The Immigration Judge failed to consider that circumstances in Respondent’s case have not changed since the NTA’s issuance and continuation is in the government’s best interest under 8 C.F.R. § 239.2(a)(7).”

“The Immigration Judge failed to consider that ICE’s sole reason for requesting dismissal is to pursue expedited removal against Respondent, which it cannot lawfully do because a decision to pursue expedited removal as a blanket practice based on a political change has nothing to do with the individual circumstances of the Respondent’s case.”

If you did not oppose dismissal or did not say that you wanted to appeal the immigration court’s decision because you didn’t understand what that meant:

“The Immigration Judge violated their duty to develop the record and inform the pro se Respondent of the consequences of dismissal, including immediate detention and summary removal. Respondent’s failure to oppose dismissal and/or waive appeal was not knowing or intelligent under *Matter of Patino*, 23 I&N Dec. 74 (BIA 2001) and *Matter of Rodriguez-Diaz*, 22 I&N Dec. 1320 (BIA 2000).”

If the immigration court did not consider your arguments against dismissal:

“The Immigration Judge erred by granting a unilateral motion by ICE and failing to provide Respondent an adequate opportunity to respond to ICE’s motion to dismiss and/or consider Respondent’s arguments against dismissal. *Matter of G-N-C-*, 22 I&N Dec. 281, 284-85 (BIA 1998) (“To the extent that these proceedings were terminated without considering arguments from both sides, the Immigration Judge erred.”); 8 C.F.R. § 1240.9 (“In his or her discretion, the immigration judge may exclude from the record any arguments made in connection with motions, applications, requests, or objections, but in such event the person affected may submit a brief.”).”

If you previously applied for asylum before the immigration court:

“The Immigration Judge erred by violating Respondent’s statutory right to seek asylum under INA § 208(a)(1) and the Due Process Clause. The Immigration Judge violated Respondent’s right to a hearing on the merits of their claim. *Matter of W-Y-U-*, 27 I&N Dec. 17, 19 (BIA 2017); 8 C.F.R. § 1240.11(c)(3).”

If you previously passed a Credible Fear Interview:

“The Immigration Judge erred by failing to consider that Respondent had previously passed a Credible Fear Interview and therefore cannot be placed into the expedited removal process again under INA § 235. In light of the fact that Respondent had previously passed a Credible Fear Interview, the Immigration Judge further erred by failing to consider that circumstances in Respondent’s case have not changed since the NTA’s issuance and continuation is in the government’s best interest under 8 C.F.R. § 239.2(a)(7).”

7. Do you desire oral argument before the Board of Immigration Appeals?
- Oral argument is a hearing in which both sides are allowed to present their case to court. The BIA rarely grants oral argument. Check “No.” This box is already checked for you in the template below.

8. Do you intend to file a separate written brief or statement after filing this Notice of Appeal?

- This question asks whether you will file a separate brief to explain what mistakes the immigration judge made by dismissing your case. It is a good idea to check “Yes.” Otherwise, you will need to write out all of the reasons for your appeal in detail on a separate piece of paper with your Notice of Appeal. This box is already checked for you in the template below.
- Remember that if you check “yes,” the BIA will send you a notice in the mail about when your brief is due. If you do not file your brief before that deadline, your appeal will probably be denied.
- You should try to find legal counsel as soon as possible to file your separate written brief. See below for how to begin looking for legal counsel.

9. If you are unrepresented, do you give consent to the BIA Pro Bono Project to have your case screened by the Project for potential placement with a free attorney or accredited representative, which may include sharing a summary of your case with potential attorneys and accredited representatives?

- Select “No.” Although the BIA Pro Bono Project still appears on this form, the government has discontinued the BIA Pro Bono Project. Therefore, checking “Yes” here will not lead to any benefit.

10. Print Name

- Write your full name.

11. Sign here

- Add your signature and the date.

12. Mailing Address

- In the box on the left, include your full mailing address. Make sure it is correct and contains all components, including an apartment number, if any. The BIA will send you important documents related to your case to this address.
- The box on the right asks for the mailing address of your lawyer or representative. You can leave this blank or write “N/A” (meaning not applicable). The template below includes N/A.

13. Proof of Service

- Above “Opposing Party,” write “Assistant Chief Counsel of DHS - ICE.” The template below already includes this.
- Add your name, date, and the address of the government attorney, and sign.
- By completing this section, you are swearing that you are sending a copy of your motion to the government’s attorney.

14. Attach payment or Form EOIR-26A: “Fee Waiver Request” (a copy of this form is provided below)

- If you can pay the filing fee, you can attach a check or money order to the Form EOIR-26 for exactly \$1,010.00 made payable to “United States Department of Justice.” If you are paying by check, make sure that you have enough funds in your account. Your appeal may be dismissed if you don’t have the money in your account.
- Alternatively, you can pay online by bank account transfer or debit/credit card at <https://epay.eoir.justice.gov/index>. Print the receipt and include it with your Form EOIR-26.
- If you cannot pay the filing fee, complete Form EOIR-26A: “Notice of Appeal from a Decision of an Immigration Judge.” You must include your Name, A-number, signature, date, and information about your finances. Under question 4, you can also include any other information to explain why you cannot pay. For example, you can explain that you are currently detained and have no income.

15. Make three copies of everything. Scan or take a picture of everything to keep for your records. You may also want to email yourself a copy so that you have a record.

16. Mail one copy to the BIA and one copy to the government attorney. If you are detained, you can use the mailing service available in detention. However, it is advisable to pay for what is called “Certified Mail” for the package to the court. If possible, you could ask someone on the outside to mail it via Certified Mail. This is an additional service, but it helps you have proof that you sent the documents. Keep the mail receipt with your records.

☐ After mailing copies to the BIA and the government attorney, give one copy to your ICE deportation officer and tell them that because you are appealing your case, ICE cannot put you in expedited removal.

☐ Start looking for a legal help for your written brief. You can search for nonprofit legal organizations here:

<https://www.immigrationadvocates.org/nonprofit/legaldirectory/>. Many nonprofits also provide recommendations for private attorneys in the area if they are unable to take your case. Your attorney can be located anywhere in the U.S. as long as they are authorized to practice before the Department of Justice.

WARNING: Only a licensed attorney or authorized representative working for an organization recognized by the Department of Justice can represent noncitizens in their immigration case. Beware of unauthorized practitioners of immigration law commonly known as notarios; unlike notary publics in certain other countries, notary publics in the United States lack the authority to provide any legal representation.
