



A PRO SE GUIDE TO FILING A MOTION TO CHANGE VENUE IN IMMIGRATION COURT

Do you currently live or are you detained somewhere that is far away from the immigration court that is hearing your case? You can request to change your immigration court location to one that is closer to where you are by filing a Motion to Change Venue in your immigration case.¹

This guide is not a substitute for independent legal advice supplied by legal counsel familiar with your case.

1. Who is this guide for?

This guide is for “**pro se**” people who are in “**removal proceedings**” in immigration court who want to move their immigration court location to somewhere closer to where they are.

“**Pro se**” is a legal term that means people who are representing themselves without a lawyer.

“**Removal proceedings**” are also known as deportation proceedings. They are hearings held before an immigration judge to decide whether the person can be deported.

If you are **detained**, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) is supposed to file the Form I-830, “Notice to EOIR: Alien Address,” with the immigration court to notify the court of your detention status and location. When ICE delays filing Form I-830, this delays the progress of the removal proceedings and extends your time in detention. For this reason, you may want to use this guide to try to alert the immigration court yourself of your detention status and location.

How do I know if I am in removal proceedings in immigration court and need to request a change of my immigration court location?

You can go to <https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/> or call 1-800-898-7180 to find out if you have a case in Immigration Court and the location and address of the court. You need to know your A number, which begins with the letter A and is followed by an 8- or 9-digit number. This number is likely on your immigration documents.

You are likely **NOT** in removal proceedings if:

- You were detained after an immigration judge dismissed your removal proceedings. In this case, you are likely in an expedited removal process that does not require a motion to change venue.
- When you were detained, you already had an order of deportation issued by immigration judge or an immigration official at the border when you attempted to enter the United States.

These circumstances do not require a motion to change venue.

2. How do I change the location of my immigration court hearings?

You need to prepare a **Motion to Change Venue**. You must include:

1. Change of Address/Contact Information Form
 - This is also known as the Form EOIR-33. You can submit this separately or together with your Motion to Change Venue.
2. Motion to Change Venue
 - The motion must explain why you need to move your court location.
 - If you are not detained, you can explain that you recently moved and why it would be difficult for you to travel to the same immigration court for your hearings.
 - If you are detained, you can explain that ICE detained you despite you having an open case before the immigration judge and that ICE has not yet notified the immigration court of your detained status and current location in an ICE detention facility far away from the immigration court.
3. Evidence
 - You should include proof of your new address as evidence attached to your motion.
 - If you are detained, you need evidence to prove that you are currently detained at an ICE detention facility far away and in the jurisdiction of another immigration court. If you have access to the internet and a printer, you could go to the ICE detainee locator website (<https://locator.ice.gov/>), search for yourself, and attach the result. If you do not have access to the internet or a printer, you could ask a loved one to print and mail the ICE detainee locator result to you, or you can include: “I am detained and being denied access to the law library to provide evidence to confirm I am in detention.”
4. Proposed order of the immigration judge
 - This is a standard document that is filed with most immigration court motions. You only need to fill out the city and state of the immigration court, your name, and your A-number.
5. Proof of service
 - By completing and signing this document, you are swearing that you are sending a copy of your motion to the government’s attorney.

3. When and where do I submit my motion?

You should submit this motion as soon as you are ready to make a request. If you are including a Change of Address/Contact Information Form, you must submit it **within 5 days of moving**.

You need to mail a copy of the documents listed above to both the **Immigration Court** where your case is pending and the **government attorney**.

At the end of this guide, we have attached a list of the addresses of each immigration court and the government attorney office that handles cases at each court. Sometimes those addresses can change, so, if possible, we recommend also following the steps below to verify that the address is correct.

How do I find the address for the Immigration Court?

If you don't know in which immigration court your case is pending, you can go to <https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/> to find out the location and address of the court. You need to know your A number, which begins with the letter A and is followed by an 8- or 9-digit number. Once you enter your A number, look under "Court Contact Information" for the court address. It will look like this:

If you know the name of the immigration court, but you don't know the full address, you can find a list of all immigration courts at this link: <https://www.justice.gov/eoir/immigration-court-administrative-control-list>.

How do I find the address for the government attorney?

The office of the government attorney is known as the “Office of the Principal Legal Advisor” (OPLA) or “Office of Chief Counsel” (OCC). There are OPLA offices all over the country – just like immigration courts. It is important to send your documents to the correct location. There is a list of OPLA addresses at the end of this guide.

To find out the address of the correct office for the government attorney in your case, try:

- Looking through your immigration court documents to see if there are any documents from the government. Typically, any documents filed by the government will have the address of the government attorney at the **top left of the cover page**. It will sometimes say “Chief Counsel, Department of Homeland Security, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement” followed by the mailing address.
- Calling the court where your case is pending and ask them for the address of the correct Office of the Principal Legal Advisor.
- Visiting <https://www.ice.gov/contact/field-offices?office=12> for a list of OPLA locations in each state. If the state where your case will be heard has more than one office, call the court to be sure you have the correct address.

WARNING: *The information you provide—including your new address—will be shared with the immigration court and with Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) as part of your immigration case.*

It’s important to keep your address up to date so you don’t miss important notices about your case, like hearing dates or decisions. If you don’t update your address or miss a court notice, you could be ordered removed (deported) in your absence.

4. What happens next?

Remember: Until your Motion is **GRANTED**, your case will continue at the same immigration court location, and you may need to travel to that court for your immigration hearings.

Once you submit your motion, wait for the court to send you a new notice. If three weeks have passed and you have not received anything, call the court to find out if they received your motion and what the decision was. A list of courts can be found here: <https://www.justice.gov/eoir/immigration-court-administrative-control-list>.

Don't wait and don't forget to stay on top of your case – it's your responsibility!

To check the status of your case, visit <https://acis.eoir.justice.gov/>. You need to know your A number, which begins with the letter A and is followed by an 8- or 9-digit number. Once you enter your A number, look under “Next Hearing Information.” It will look like this:

You can also call 1-800-898-7180 and check the status with your A number. Option #1 gives you information about your next court date.

Once your motion is granted, you will receive a notice from the court and your next hearing information should have the address of the immigration court that is close to your location. Until then, make sure you don't miss any hearings at the old immigration court location!

5. Checklist for Motion to Change Venue

Below are template documents that you will need to prepare a motion to change venue. You can fill it out on your computer or print it out (single-sided) and write legibly in blue or black ink. If you are filling it out on your computer, click the greyed-out lines to add information. Only fill out the greyed lines – nothing else!

Follow these instructions to make sure you are completing it correctly:

☐ Fill out the Change of Address/Contact Information Form (Form EOIR-33/IC) with your name, A-number, old address, current address, signature, and date. Fill out the proof of service section with your name, the date, the address for the government attorney, and sign. You can also complete this form online by visiting <https://respondentaccess.eoir.justice.gov>.

☐ On the next page, add:

- Your full name and your address on the top left of the page
- If you are not detained, write “NON” before “DETAINED” at the top right of the page. If you are detained, leave this blank.
- The city and state of your current immigration court
- Your full name right underneath where it says “In the Matter of”
- Your A-number next to “File No.”
- The name of the immigration judge
- The date and time of your next hearing.

☐ On the page that begins with “RESPONDENT’S PRO SE MOTION TO CHANGE VENUE,” put your name and the city and state of the current Immigration Court in the spaces in first paragraph. In the large space underneath, explain why you are asking the court to move your case.

- Say that you have moved to a new address and include your new address.
- Mention any evidence that you are including with your motion.
- Explain why it would be difficult for you to go back to your current immigration court for your hearing.
- If your spouse or children are included in your case, you can write here, “My spouse/children (full names and A-numbers) are derivatives in my case, and they are included in this motion.” You still need to include separate Change of Address/Contact Information Form (Form EOIR-33/IC) for them. If you are moving your case because you were detained but your spouse or children

are not detained, they should speak to an immigration attorney about their options before filing a motion to change venue.

□ The next page contains some additional information that the immigration judge may need from you before the judge can agree to change your immigration court location.

- In the first blank, you can include whether you are “admitting allegations and conceding charges” on the Notice to Appear (NTA):

WARNING: “Admitting allegations and conceding charges” means that you have read the document called Notice to Appear (NTA) and you agree with what the government has written there. If you have **not** already admitted the allegations of fact and conceded the charges of removability in your NTA, the immigration judge may require you to do that before they agree to transfer your case to another court. However, admitting the allegations of fact and conceding the charges may not be the best decision for everyone. **Only if you agree with all the factual allegations in your Notice to Appear**, you can write in your motion: “I admit the allegations of fact in the Notice to Appear.” Given your pro se status and the legal consequences of the charges of removability, you could write “I deny the charges in the Notice to Appear until I am able to discuss these charges with legal counsel or have access to pro se guidance that will help me understand the charges.”

- In the second blank, you can include what forms of immigration relief you intend to apply for. For example, if you fear return to your home country, you can write: “asylum, withholding of removal, and relief under the Convention Against Torture.”
- You must either name a country for removal or a statement that you do not want to give a country for removal. Naming a country for removal means that if you are ordered deported, you are letting the immigration court know where you want to be deported to. If you intend to apply for asylum or you do not want to name any country for removal, you can simply write “I decline to designate a country for removal.”

☐ The next page says “Exhibit.” Exhibits are the documents that you are including as evidence. After this page, attach any evidence you want to include with your motion. Remember to include proof of your new address. For example, you can include a copy of a utility bill, lease, or document from your child’s new school. The document should show your name and new address. If you do not have any other proof, you can ask for a letter from someone who lives with you at your new address. You should also include a copy of their ID and proof of address.

- If you are including multiple documents, attach your evidence in an organized manner. Label and refer to each document in your motion so the judge can easily match them to your points. For example, Exhibit A: Electricity Bill, Exhibit B: Rental Agreement, etc.

☐ On the next page, above “ORDER OF THE IMMIGRATION JUDGE,” add the city and state of your current immigration court, your name (next to “In the Matter of”) and your A number (next to “File No.”) at the top of the document. Leave everything else blank. The rest is for the immigration judge to complete.

☐ On the next page, where it says “proof of service,” put your name, A-number, the date, and the address of the government attorney. Next to “By:” explain how you are going to send a copy to the government attorney. You can say, for example, “priority mail through U.S. Postal Service.” With your signature you are swearing that you are sending a copy of the motion to the government attorney.

☐ Make two copies of everything. Scan or take a picture of everything to keep for your records.

☐ Mail one copy to the immigration court and one copy to the government attorney. It is advisable to pay for what is called “Certified Mail” for the package to the court. This is an additional service, but it helps you have proof that you sent the documents. If you are detained, sending via “Certified Mail” may not be an option from detention, so you can send it by regular mail or ask a family member or friend on the outside to help you mail the package. Keep the mail receipt with your records.

☐ If you do not hear back from the court for three weeks, call the court to find out if they have received your motion and what the decision was. Continue checking to see when the motion is decided. You can set reminders on your phone or calendar to check every day!

Instructions: To complete this form, fill out all blanks below, including proof of service, which certifies that you will provide a copy of this form to the Department of Homeland Security (DHS). After filling in the blanks and signing both the declaration and proof of service, you must submit the form electronically, in person, or by mail. If submitting electronically, file in Respondent Portal at <https://respondentaccess.eoir.justice.gov>. Attorneys and fully accredited representatives submitting this form electronically must file in Case Portal at <https://portal.eoir.justice.gov>. If submitting by mail, follow the mailing instructions on Page 2. You must submit a separate copy of this form for each individual who has a case pending in immigration court and whom the change of information affects.

You must file this form with the immigration court within five working days of the change to your contact information, or your receipt of a charging document (e.g., a Notice to Appear) with incorrect contact information. The immigration court will send all official correspondence (e.g., notices, decisions) to the address you provide. The immigration court will only make any change(s) to your contact information in EOIR's records upon receipt of this form; the immigration court will not change your contact information based on different information on pleadings, motions, or other communications with the court.

If you fail to appear at any hearing before an immigration judge when notice of that hearing or other official correspondence was served on you or sent to the address you provided, DHS may take you into custody. In addition, the immigration court may conduct your hearing in your absence and enter an order of removal, deportation, or exclusion against you. If the court enters such an order, you may be ineligible for certain forms of relief from removal under the Immigration and Nationality Act as follows:

- If you are in *removal* proceedings: You will be subject to an order of removal for a period of ten years after the date of entry of the final order. You may also become ineligible for voluntary departure, cancellation of removal, and adjustment of status or change of status.
- If you are in *deportation* proceedings: You will be subject to an order of deportation for a period of five years after the date of the entry of the final order. You may also become ineligible for voluntary departure, suspension of deportation or voluntary departure, and adjustment of status or change of status.
- If you are in *exclusion* proceedings: Your application for admission to the United States may be considered withdrawn.
